. T/U 1812 Site 13. This Group dive bombed the dispersal area for aircraff at Chartres Airfield. 3 Sq: Ahloth 12 planes; Bhllth 11 planes; Ghl2th 12 planes. 35 P-47's. Sombs were dropped on eireraft dispersal area in woods east of Chartres. A Sq started dive at 13,000 ft. 60 degree angle of dive, and released bombs at 5000 ft. All bombs burst in target area. Results were unobserved due to woods. All aircraft strafed woods on way down. 1 bomb hung up and was returned to base. At 1930 hours, vicinity of Amilly R-3203, at 13,000 ft. was attacked by 20 to 25 109's and 190's. Attack came from 3 o'clock low and 12 o'clock high simultaneously. Five encounters from 13,000 ft to 3000 ft. 1 unidentified aircraft believe to be P-47 seen going down burning and exploding in woods near St Armoult des Bois (R-2308). 1 unidentified parachute was also seen decending about the general area of encounters. 2 enemy aircraft were destroyed in the encounters that took place. 1 MB 109 and 1 WW 190 were claimed destroyed. B Sq released bombs at 2,500 ft after a peel from 15,000. 65 deg ree angle of dive. All bombs hit in target area (Ruhlo31). Black smoke seen to rise from 3 different fires. At 1920, m ear H445052, 14,000 ft altitude, 8 Sq was jumped by 20 plus enemy aircraft. During the encounter 1 ME 109 and 2 FW 190's were destroyed. C Sq provided top cover for both A and S Sq. At 1927 hours. 30 plus ME 109's were observed by C Sq 2 miles NW of Chartres, at 18.000 ft. 2 of our aircraft attacked 1 ME 109, from 18,000 ft. Both observed many hits from their tracers. Planes went into tight lufberry to deck. ME 109 seen to crash land in an open field and pilot seem to run away from plane. 4 aircraft were bounced by 4 FW 190's. 18.000 ft. Flight turned into the FW 190's and 3 aircraft dove on one enemy aircraft firing several bursts and observing many hits. Enemy aircraft was last seen diving into a cloud. Claim 1 destroyed and 1 probable destroyed. Scattered clouds from 4.000 to 12.000 ft. At Chartres, heavy, moderate and inaccurate flak. T/D 2027 Site 13.
